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#### PREFACE:

The Northern River Basins Study was initiated through the "Canada-Alberta-Northwest Territories Agreement Respecting the Peace-Athabasca-Slave River Basin Study, Phase II - Technical Studies" which was signed September 27, 1991. The purpose of the Study is to understand and characterize the cumulative effects of development on the water and aquatic environment of the Study Area by coordinating with existing programs and undertaking appropriate new technical studies.

This publication reports the method and findings of particular work conducted as part of the Northern River Basins Study. As such, the work was governed by a specific terms of reference and is expected to contribute information about the Study Area within the context of the overall study as described by the Study Final Report. This report has been reviewed by the Study Science Advisory Committee in regards to scientific content and has been approved by the Study Board of Directors for public release.

It is explicit in the objectives of the Study to report the results of technical work regularly to the public. This objective is served by distributing project reports to an extensive network of libraries, agencies, organizations and interested individuals and by granting universal permission to reproduce the material.

### WATER RESOURCES USE AND MANAGEMENT ISSUES FOR THE PEACE, ATHABASCA AND SLAVE RIVER BASINS: STAKEHOLDER SCREENING SURVEY

#### STUDY PERSPECTIVE

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The Northern River Basins Study Board will be formulating recommendations covering many areas likely of consequence or interest to basin residents. In an effort to assist the Board in this task, a series of projects were initiated to query the residents on their use of northern river basins waters. Existing information was either not available or as extensive as required in its coverage for the area under study. The project report details the efforts taken to develop a list of stakeholders that should be approached for input within a workshop setting.

#### Related Study Questions

Who are the stakeholders and what are the consumptive and non-consumptive uses of the water resources in the river basins?

Information from this project was used to conduct subsequent surveys of interest groups, industries and municipal governments. A finalized list of stakeholders and the questionnaires used, as amended by the Study Board, will be included in the report for the surveys project. Analysis of all the surveys, including a treatment of non-respondents, will be included in a forthcoming report that will synthesize a response to NRBS Guiding Question 3.

#### REPORT SUMMARY

Project 4121-D1, the Stakeholder Screening Survey was undertaken to build on the data collected in Project 4101-B1. Project 4101-B1 identified stakeholder groups that use or have an interest in the Peace, Athabasca and Slave River systems and recommended a workshop process for identifying the concerns of the stakeholder groups about water use in the three river systems. In Project 4121-D1, these organizations were surveyed to elicit sufficient information about the stakeholder groups to plan stakeholder workshops and to identify in a preliminary way the issues that should be addressed in the workshops. As well, through the survey process, a more complete stakeholder list was developed.

#### **Survey Results**

The results of the survey briefly summarized are:

- stakeholder groups have a broad cross section of interests in the Peace, Slave and Athabasca River Systems including consumptive uses (fishing, trapping and agriculture), non-consumptive uses (environmental, recreational and cultural), commercial interests (primarily tourism), and political interests (First Nations, Metis Settlements and community associations);
- the majority of stakeholder groups are comprised of local or regional members with 75% or more of their members living north of Edmonton;
- the type of river use reported most frequently was recreation (52 percent) and hunting and fishing (51.3 percent);
- the change in water quantity and/or quality reported by respondents most often was change in water flows (58.3 percent) and increase in pollutants (40.9 percent);
- the most frequently mentioned water use concerns were the need to preserve ecosystems (28.9 percent) and concerns about pulp mill development (26.2 percent) and general industrial development (24.8 percent);
- eighty five percent of respondents indicated that their organization is willing to attend NRBS workshops;
- the most frequently mentioned workshop locations were: Peace River, Grande Prairie, Athabasca, Fort McMurray, Edmonton, Fort Chipewyan and Fort Smith;
- the respondent preference for day, time and duration of workshops was diverse and inconclusive;

■ ninety three percent of respondents asked that their organization be placed on the NRBS mailing list.

#### **Conclusions and Recommendations**

The following conclusions and recommendations should guide the design of workshops and further stakeholder groups data collection:

- current public communication initiatives should be reviewed to ensure that stakeholder groups are receiving information about the Study;
- workshops should be held in the following regional centres: Peace River, Grande Prairie, Athabasca, Fort McMurray, Edmonton, Fort Chipewyan, Fort Smith and Fort Vermilion;
- all interested stakeholder groups should be invited to send a representative to a regional workshop;
- a workshop agenda and background information should be sent to stakeholder organizations with sufficient lead time for the organization to prepare for the meeting;
- the workshops should generally be eight hours or less;
- the timing of the workshops should depend on the targeted stakeholder agencies;
- an explanation of how the information collected in the workshops will be used should be communicated to stakeholder groups.

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#### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

The South Slave Research Centre (SSRC) was contracted by the Northern River Basin Study Other Uses Component to carry out the Stakeholder Screening Project (4121-D1), an assessment of stakeholder groups. The project was initiated June 1, 1994 and the draft report was submitted on July 14. The main thrust of the study in the first three weeks of the project was to design the survey instrument and obtain telephone numbers and contact names for the 147 organizations on the existing stakeholder list supplied by Northern River Basin Study (NRBS) based on the results of Project 4101-B1. During that time period, the Other Uses Component decided that the Government, Municipal or Business stakeholders would not be surveyed because information on these groups is available either through public documents or through regulated, licensed activity.

In consultation with the Other Uses Component and the Traditional Knowledge Component, a decision was made to include Aboriginal groups on the stakeholder list. Research by the SSRC identified an additional 109 stakeholder organizations for a total survey sample of 256 organizations. Telephone surveys were initiated on June 17 and concluded on July 8, a predetermined cutoff date. Telephone surveys were completed with 172 organizations or 67 percent of the survey sample.

#### 1.1 Scope

The terms of reference identified the following project requirements:

- in consultation with the leader of the Other Uses Component, to develop a questionnaire that provides sufficient information about stakeholder groups to assess whether they ought to be included in subsequent workshops;
- to review and update an existing list of stakeholders provided by the Other Uses Component;
- to survey as many organizations as possible;
- to design a database summarizing the survey results for subsequent analysis by the Other Uses Component;
- to analyze the survey results and recommend which groups ought to be included in the subsequent workshops, and recommend locations for six to eight workshops; and
- to provide a brief report which summarizes the results of this project and provides an assessment of the validity of the sample results in terms of response rate and potential errors or omissions.

In addition to the terms of reference, the NRBS project liaison officer provided ongoing

direction to the scope of the project.

#### 1.2 Project Activities

The South Slave Research Centre has provided the following services under the contract:

- the existing stakeholder list prepared under Project 4101-B1 and the NRBS mailing list have been integrated into an updated Master Stakeholder List;
- the Master Stakeholder list has been updated to include telephone/fax numbers and identify a current contact person;
- the Master Stakeholder list has been expanded from 147 stakeholders to 256 stakeholders;
- a stakeholder questionnaire has been designed for the purpose of soliciting or confirming the following information:
  - organization name, address, contact name and telephone/fax number,
  - category of organization (aboriginal, recreation, environment etc.),
  - general goal of organization,
  - number and location of membership,
  - geopolitical affiliation,
  - types of water use,
  - water management issues or concerns,
  - degree of interest in attending a water management workshop, and
  - preferred location, time and duration of workshop.
- data analysis contained within this report provides the following types of information and makes the following recommendations:
  - details of survey sample and number of respondents,
  - types of use by organization, number of members within organizations, and categories of stakeholders,
  - observed change in water quality and water quantity identified by organization membership
  - comparison of water management concerns by organization category,
  - water management issues to be included on the workshop agenda
  - organization that should attend the regional workshops, and
  - workshop locations, time and duration.

Although most of the project activities were identified within the terms of reference, there have been some important changes and additions to the terms of reference. Specifically, the terms of reference originally stated that telephone numbers and complete list of stakeholders

would be provided by the NRBS. However, a number of circumstances including the time lag since completion of Project 4101-B1, required that the SSRC carried out extensive research to develop a telephone directory of existing organizations and identify additions to the master stakeholder list.

#### 2.0 PROJECT METHODS

The research methods used in this project included the design of a stakeholder questionnaire, the administration of a telephone survey to a predetermined survey sample, the design of a database into which the survey results were coded, and data analysis techniques to interpret the database output.

#### 2.1 Stakeholder Questionnaire

The stakeholder questionnaire was designed to survey the attitude of stakeholder organizations in three areas. The questionnaire surveyed whether representatives of stakeholder groups were interested in attending workshops, the extent to which stakeholder groups used the water resources, and the major water resource issues of concern among the different user groups.

The stakeholder questionnaire was prepared in consultation with the Other Uses Component staff. It was designed for ease of administration over the telephone and ease of data entry and analysis. It consisted of both open-ended and closed-ended questions. Issue identification questions were open ended and responses were categorized by the project coordinator before entry into the data base.

Two survey instruments were developed: a standard questionnaire and a questionnaire designed for surveying First Nations and Metis Settlements. The need for a second questionnaire was established in consultation with the Traditional Knowledge Component and the Project Liaison Officer. On review of the standard questionnaire, some questions directed to First Nations and Metis Settlements were viewed as unnecessary and inappropriate to the objectives of the project. Therefore a customized survey was developed for First Nations and Metis Settlements. Other Aboriginal organizations were surveyed using the original questionnaire.

#### 2.2 Stakeholder Categories

Stakeholder groups were categorized as Aboriginal, Agriculture, Business, Community Associations, Commercial, Environment, Municipal, Recreation and River Transportation. The NRBS Project Liaison Officer advised that the business and municipal categories would not be surveyed due to limited project resources and given that water use information from these organizations was available through regulatory and licensing data.

#### 2.3 Sample Selection Methods

Stakeholder groups were selected using three primary techniques. One hundred and nine organizations were selected from the master stakeholder list which combined the NRBS mailing list with the stakeholders identified in Project 4101-B1. The SSRC also contacted umbrella organizations to obtain the names of member organizations. Through these research techniques an initial contact stakeholder list was established. During the survey process, respondents were asked if they knew of any additional organizations whom they felt should be included in the survey. An additional one hundred and nine stakeholders were identified through this process.

Three attempts were made to contact stakeholder representatives. Where there was no answer at the number we were given for the organization, subsequent telephone calls were made during the day and the early evening to a work or home number. Where possible, messages were left asking respondents to telephone the SSRC collect, in order to identify the organization's interest in participating in a water resource workshop in the fall. If the respondent failed to call back, two follow up telephone calls were made to the organization.

One hundred and seventy two stakeholders (67 percent) responded to the survey out of the 256 stakeholders identified. Of the 84 who failed to respond to the survey, 11 stakeholders (four percent) were contacted but declined to participate in the survey and we were unable to contact the remaining 72 stakeholders (28 percent) using the procedures identified above.

#### 2.4 Telephone Survey

The telephone survey was first pilot tested with six individuals of varying education and professional backgrounds within the town of Fort Smith. Upon completion of revisions made in response to the first pilot test, a second pilot test was made using six stakeholders representing each of the major stakeholder categories.

The telephone interviews were carried out by the project coordinator and three research assistants. The research assistants were given a one-day training session in telephone interview techniques.

The ratio of telephone calls made, to the number of surveys initiated, was approximately 3:1.

#### 2.5 Data Coding

Thirteen of the 16 interview questions were open ended which allowed a wide variety of responses. Upon completion of the survey, these responses were grouped into appropriate categories. Two members of the research team individually coded a sample selection of the responses to ensure that the coding categories were not ambiguous. However, all survey coding was supervised by the project coordinator to ensure consistent interpretation of responses.

#### 2.6 Duties and Responsibilities of SSRC Staff

The project manager and project coordinator developed the questionnaires. As noted above, the project coordinator and the three research assistants carried out the telephone

surveys. The project coordinator determined response categories for the open ended questions and coded those responses. The project manager and the project coordinator analyzed the data and made the recommendations contained in this report.

#### 2.7 Paradox Database

The results of this survey have been entered into the Borland Paradox Database. Paradox is a full-featured relational database management system that operates in a Microsoft Windows environment. Paradox supports both Paradox and dBase table formats. Data can easily be easily translated into either application.

#### 2.8 Potential Errors and Omissions in the Data

Although strictly applied research methods were adopted to minimize data errors and omissions, a number of concerns remain.

There were unequal response rates from each of the stakeholder categories and this proportionally distorts the project findings. Analysis by stakeholder category has been used to minimize this effect where possible. However, given the small sample size the responses have not been weighted. Therefore, the Aboriginal and Recreation categories, with the highest number of responses bias the results of the survey when viewed as a whole. Conversely, the limited number of responses in the Associations and River Transportation categories limit their representation in the summary data.

There are a number of potential sampling errors. A number of stakeholders in the sample declined to participate in the survey as they are uncomfortable with telephone interviews. Other stakeholders declined to answer particular questions saying they required more time to consider the questions. We were unable to reach a number of organizations because we could not obtain current phone numbers or we had difficulty in reaching their mobile phone. Other stakeholders were not surveyed as they were on holiday during the survey period. Finally, a number organizations in the Environmental and Aboriginal categories were reluctant or unwilling to participate in the study because they are constantly asked to speak on behalf of their organizations at the expense of other duties.

#### 3.0 SURVEY RESULTS

This section summarizes the results of the survey of all stakeholder organizations and includes the results of the survey of Aboriginal organizations. The combination of data was viewed as appropriate because the questions in both surveys were either the same or very comparable.

#### 3.1 Stakeholder groups

Stakeholder groups were categorized by group prior to the survey. Although these categories remained unchanged, the organizations were also surveyed as to their stated aims and interests.

#### Survey Respondents




Figure 1: Percentage of Respondents by Category

Respondents were asked to briefly summarize the aims and interests of the stakeholder groups that they represent. The composition of organizations that responded to the survey is similar to the composition of the survey sample as a whole. The distribution of organizations among categories is shown in Figure 1.

Just over half of the groups (52 percent) were categorized as either Recreation or Aboriginal organizations. There were 19 or more organizations surveyed from each group except Community Associations (six) and River Transportation organizations (one).

#### Stated Purpose of Stakeholder groups




Figure 2: Organizational Aims and Interests

Figure 2 shows that the aims and interests of 37 percent of the groups fell within the non-consumptive advocacy category. Of these, 15.8 percent focused on environmental issues.

Thirty one percent of the respondents represented consumptive organizations. Hunting and fishing organizations were the largest category in this group and accounted for 14 percent of total responses - the second largest in the survey. In the commercial category, the respondents almost exclusively identified tourism as the main aim or interest of the organization. Just under 23 percent of organizations identified their organization's mandate to be political or economic. The largest group in this category was the Aboriginal Associations which accounted for 10.5 percent of the total.

#### 3.2 Membership of Stakeholder groups

Respondents were asked to describe the members of the groups they represent. The responses were categorized in six categories: local, regional, provincial, professional, Aboriginal or religious. Seventy four organizations (43 percent) were classified as being 'local', where the majority of members reside in the local community.<sup>1</sup> The significant number of organizations made up of local members reflects the strong presence of community organizations representing

Local communities refer to membership from the same town or surrounding area as the organizations mailing address. Regional members refer to organizations with members from more than one town or surrounding area in Northern Alberta. The provincial category applied to those organizations that had members throughout Alberta or national or international members.

community interests.




Figure 3: Composition of Membership

Thirty six organizations (21 percent) had a province-wide membership while 28 organizations (16 percent) were comprised of regional members from different communities north of Edmonton. Aboriginal membership refers to political organizations, specifically First Nations and Metis Settlements. This category does not include Aboriginal organizations such as friendship centres which have a social mandate for a diverse constituency. Finally, three percent of organizations identified their members as professional body and two percent were members of a religious community (in this case Hutterite Colonies).

#### Membership Size




Figure 4: Size of Membership

Respondents were asked the size of the stakeholder groups they represent. Figure 4 shows that the majority of organizations have a relatively small membership. One hundred and four (63 percent) of the organizations responding to the survey had less than 250 members.<sup>2</sup>

Twenty four of these organizations (14 percent) had less than 25 members, 47 (28 percent) had between 25 and 99 members, and 34 (20 percent) had 100 to 249 members. There were no Aboriginal organizations under 100 members while over 55 percent of organizations in all other categories had members with less than 100 people. The very largest organizations were usually national and international in scope. Table 1 below details the breakdown of membership by the category of the organization.

Table 1 has been included to demonstrate the significant difference between the various types of organizations and membership size. For example all the Aboriginal organizations surveyed had more than 100 members even though 42 percent of all organizations sampled have less than 100 members.

#### Members Living North of Edmonton





Figure 5: Proportion of Stakeholder Members Living North of Edmonton

Respondents were asked to estimate the percent of members of their organization that live north of Edmonton. Figure 5 indicates that 106 or 71 percent of the organizations surveyed had over 75 percent of their members in Northern Alberta. These figures do not include First Nations and Métis Settlements. In consultation with the Traditional Knowledge Component, it was decided that all Aboriginal people belonging to a Northern Alberta community have a vested interest in the northern river basins whether or not they are currently living in the area.

Organizations who have 25 percent or less of their members based in Northern Alberta were the second largest category. This reflects the observation that organizations that are provincial in scope have relatively few members in rural Northern Alberta.

#### Location of Communities of Organizations Northern Membership

The collation of responses to a query about the communities in which the stakeholder group members live indicated that 62 percent of the members belonging to stakeholder groups lived either in the same community as the main contact for the organization or in a near by local community.<sup>4</sup>

For the purpose of this report communities were defined as regional if they were further than 70 kilometres distance from one another.



Of significance in planning workshops, only 38 percent of organizations have members spread out in other regional or provincial communities.<sup>5</sup>

#### 3.3 Use of River Basins by Stakeholders

To ensure that a cross section of stakeholder groups were surveyed, respondents were asked how their organization uses the northern rivers. Table 2 shows that 87.2 percent of the organizations surveyed indicated that their members use the Peace, Athabasca and Slave River systems while 6.4 percent reported that their members do not use the river.

Table 3 provides a summary of the way in which members of organizations reported using the Peace, Athabasca and Slave River Systems. Many groups used the rivers for several different or related purposes and all responses are included in the table.

Overall, five major uses stand out as indicative of river use of stakeholder organizations. Recreational use and hunting and fishing were by far the most common river uses each being reported by over 50 percent of the respondents. Trapping (14.7), river transportation (19.3), and agriculture (11.3) were the next most common activities and were similar in that all three related to livelihood rather than leisure activities. The remaining four categories garnered less than 15 responses each. Another 11 respondents indicated that their organization did not use the three northern river systems while a similar number did not answer the question.

#### 3.4 Observed Change in Water Quantity and Water Quality

Respondents were asked in an open format if members of their organizations have noticed changes in water quality or quantity in the last ten years. The comments were then grouped in five broad categories. Table 4 below categorizes the comments by the different organizational groups about the changes they have observed.

Change in water flow was the most commonly mentioned observation. This category included observations about water level declines or increases and changes due to natural causes such as weather conditions. The second most frequent observation was the increased pollution levels. This general category included comments concerning visible pollution and observations about increased toxin levels in the river systems. Observed declines in fish and wildlife was the third most common observed change in the river system. Comments in this category included observations about the decline of fish species, the smaller size of remaining fish stock and the decreased quality of edible fish. A fair amount of consistency between organizational types is evident, although Aboriginal organizations more frequently reported observing changes in the quality of drinking water.

#### 3.5 Water Management and Water Use Concerns of Stakeholders

Table 5 details water management issues by the type of organization.

Preservation of the Northern River Basin Ecosystem was the most commonly mentioned water management concern (28.9 percent of responses). Pulp mill (26.2 percent) and industrial development (24.8 percent) were the next most frequently mentioned issues and, in combination indicate that industrial development generally may be the primary water management concern. The regulation of water flow through the Bennett dam and the potential for other dams on Northern rivers was mentioned as a water management concern by 20.1 percent of all respondents.




Figure 7: Distribution of Concerns By Organizational Group

Figure 7 shows the distribution of concerns within organizational groups.

This figure shows that recreational, Aboriginal and environmental groups have three areas of concern in common: preservation of ecosystems, pulp mill development and industrial development. However, Aboriginal groups are also concerned about drinking water supplies and clean-up of existing pollution.

#### 3.6 Preference of Organizations to Attend the NRBS Workshops




Figure 8: Willingness of Organizations to Attend NRBS Workshops

One of the objectives of the survey was to determine stakeholder interest in workshops that could be used to collect more detailed information about use of the rivers in the study area by stakeholder groups. As can be seen in Figure 8, there was an overwhelming support by organizations to attend a NRBS workshop. Only three percent of respondents said that their group would be unwilling to attend the workshop. Most of the 12 percent of undecided respondents said they would make a decision based on the workshop agenda.

A comparison of these overall results to each of the organization categories revealed a similar response rate among all the categories except the commercial organizations. Only 80 percent of commercial organizations indicated they would attend the workshops, eight percent indicated they would not and 12 percent said they were undecided.

#### 3.7 Preference of Workshop Location

Respondents were asked "In which communities do you think workshops should be held for your region?" They had the opportunity to list one or more communities. The communities listed in Table 6 were identified by five or more respondents as their preferred location for a NRBS workshop. In total 55 communities were identified and the most commonly-mentioned responses are listed in Table 6.

The results show a clear preference for workshops in the larger centres in Northern Alberta and in Edmonton. Some representatives of Aboriginal stakeholder groups felt that meetings should be held in Aboriginal communities. However, 39 communities in the 'other communities' category garnered 63 of the 238 responses (25 percent) which indicates that there is a significant demand for workshops to be held in smaller communities. This was confirmed by individual comments that participation from smaller centres would be far higher if workshops were held outside the larger centres.

#### 3.8 Preferred Day, Time and Duration of Workshops

Respondents were asked in an open format to indicate the day of week, the time of day and the length of time that would be most convenient for a workshop. This section examines these preferences in turn.

#### Day Preference

Table 7 indicates a wide range of preferences on the best day of the week to hold the workshops<sup>7</sup>. Furthermore, there are significant differences in the preferences according to the category of the stakeholder organizations.

Note that some respondents made several suggestions and all this information is presented in Table 6.

Aboriginal, Agriculture and Commercial groups and Associations generally preferred weekdays to weekends. Moreover, they clearly favoured midweek to Monday or Friday. Conversely Environmental and Recreation groups opted for a weekend workshop.

#### Time Preference

Thirty six percent of the respondents preferred evening workshops. Respondents commented that evenings made workshops more accessible to more people. The second choice of 30 percent of the respondents was mornings followed by afternoons (19 percent). Fifteen percent of respondents had no real preference.

#### Preferred Length of Time for a NRBS Workshop




Figure 9: Length of Workshop Preference

The results shown in Figure 9 indicate that respondents preferred shorter rather than longer workshops.

Sixty nine percent of respondents indicated that they would favour a workshop that did not last longer than one day. Of that group more than half said they prefer that the workshop does not last longer than four hours. Only 17 percent indicated they want a workshop that lasts longer than a day, and 14 percent said they have no preference as to the length of the workshop.

Aboriginal groups were more likely to expect the workshops to last a few days. Some respondents suggested that the workshops should last as long as it take for the information to be out on the table. Another organization suggested the workshop be held over two days. The second day should be for questions and discussion after the information has had time to sink in. Another organization voiced the same concern and suggested the workshop be held over two or more evenings.

In addition to the responses summarized above, a number of organizations made unsolicited comments about appropriate time for the workshops. Agricultural groups suggested workshops should be held in October after the crops were harvested. Conversely a number of Trappers Associations recommended the workshops be held before the start of the trapping season in early October.

#### 3.9 Request for Inclusion in the NRBS Mailing List




Figure 10: Inclusion in NRBS Mailing List

When asked if they would like their stakeholder group placed on the NRBS mailing list, only 4 percent of respondents indicated that their groups were already on the NRBS mailing list. However, as noted in Figure 10, 93 percent said they would like to be put on the mailing list.

Generally, most respondents appeared to have little in-depth understanding about the activities of the NRBS. However, the high degree of interest in learning more about the study is demonstrated by the percentage of representative of stakeholder groups asking for their groups to be placed on the mailing list.

#### 4.0 CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The conclusions and recommendations of this study represent an analysis of the quantitative data, qualitative understanding obtained through the study process and the study team's consultation with the Other Uses component Group Project Liaison Officer. The conclusions and recommendations primarily address workshop design and stakeholder information needs.

#### 4.1 Dissemination of Information to Stakeholder Groups

The Study Office should review the effectiveness of current initiatives to keep stakeholder groups informed about Study activities. The information in Figure 9 indicates that stakeholder groups do not appear to be receiving information about the Study and reasons for this should be identified. Additional activities that could be used to improve communications with stakeholder groups would be to contact all groups to thank them for their participation in the telephone survey, to provide more information on future data-collection activities, and to provide them with recent NRBS reports and\or newsletters.

#### 4.2 Number of Workshops

Eight workshops, rather than six should be held in Edmonton and Northern Alberta. Survey stakeholders indicated a strong preference for the workshops to be held in local areas. Although it is unrealistic to provide workshops in each of the 55 locations identified by survey respondents, participation in future workshops will depend on holding them in as many communities as time and

resources allow. Given the cost of workshops, an alternative approach for collecting information from stakeholder groups may be advisable if representatives from all groups are to be given an equal chance to participate in future aspects of the study. This approach would be to send questionnaires to all stakeholder groups and allow them to provide more detailed information if they think it is important. Should such an approach be used, it will be important to provide them with background information on the Northern River Basis Study and explain how this information would be used (see Section 4.8 below).

### 4.3 Location of Workshops

The eight workshops should be held in the communities of: Peace River, Grande Prairie, Athabasca, Fort McMurray, Edmonton, Fort Chipewyan, Fort Smith and Fort Vermilion. The communities list represent the most common locations recommended by surveyed stakeholders. Furthermore, these sites represent all the major geographic locations in the Northern River Basin Study Area and should be readably accessible to all stakeholder organizations with the possible exception of the groups in the upper Athabasca River basin. Respondents representing stakeholder groups preferred Fort Vermilion over High Level by a rate of 2: 1.

### 4.4 Invitations to Workshops

The NRBS should extend an invitation to attend the workshops to all stakeholders who indicated they would come to a workshop or who were undecided, along with those stakeholder organizations that could not be contacted during the survey. The only organizations who need not be invited would be those groups who stated on the survey that they would not attend a workshop and organizations that stated they did not want to participate in the survey. Two hundred and forty-five organizations would receive invitations to attend the eight workshops. Assuming an attendance rate of 80 percent, 196 organizations could be expected to show up. If eight workshops were held, attendance would average 25 people at each workshop.

## 4.5 Workshop Agenda

An agenda for the workshop and an information package about the issues that will be discussed at workshops should be mailed to stakeholder organizations in advance of requesting their participation at the workshop. A frequent comment made by stakeholders to the question of whether they would participate in a workshop was that they would have to be given a lot more information and the time to review it before they would commit to attending the workshop. This comment was made by both respondents who answered yes as well as undecided to the question whether or not they would attend a water management workshop. One umbrella organization said they required information about the workshops as soon as possible so they could ensure the participation of their local chapters. Another agricultural organization asked for workshop information by August to distribute to its members so that they could discuss and agreed upon issued prior to the workshop.

#### 4.6 Length of Workshops

The workshops should be a total of eight hours or less in length. The majority of those surveyed agree that the workshops should be less than one day in length. There was a considerable range in opinion with many expressing the view that to really debate the issues a 2 - 3 day workshop is necessary.

#### 4.7 Timing of Workshops

The workshops in Northern Alberta should be held during the middle of the week and should consist of two evening sessions. The Edmonton workshop should be held on a Saturday morning. Stakeholders were divided about when workshops should be held. Aboriginal, agriculture and community groups preferred mid week. Environmental groups preferred weekends. Recreation groups were mixed. However, the above suggestion is based on overall preferences.

#### 4.8 Use of Workshop Information

The NRBS should provide the stakeholders with details about how the information from the workshops will be used. Six stakeholders identified concerns that there are few details about how the information from the workshop will benefit their organizations in terms of addressing water management issues and water resource regulation. The NRBS should include at the top of its workshop agenda in indication of what actions will result from both the workshop and the overall finding of the Northern River Basin Study.

#### **APPENDIX 1** Terms of Reference

#### I. BACKGROUND AND OBJECTIVES

The Northern River Basins Study (NRBS) is a joint project between the governments of Canada, Alberta and the Northwest Territories that commenced in September of 1991. The purpose of the NRBS is "to characterize the cumulative effects of development on the water and aquatic environment of the Study areas by coordinating with existing programs and undertaking appropriate new technical studies". To undertake this study, a Study Board, Study Office and Science Advisory Committee were created. The study area includes the mainstems and main tributaries of the Peace, Athabasca and Slave rivers.

The Study Board developed a vision statement to provide overall guidance for the various technical activities being conducted in support of the study and also identified 16 questions that serve to focus study activities. One of these questions is:

#3. Who are the stakeholders and what are the consumptive and non-consumptive uses of the water resources in the river basins?

Nine technical groups have since been established to address these 16 questions and the Other Uses Working Group is primarily responsible for developing and undertaking research and investigations related to the use of water resources. This groups is working in close association with the Traditional Knowledge Working Group, which is responsible for collecting information on resource use and values of indigenous people and long-time residents.

In 1993/94, the Other Uses Working Group hired a consultant to undertake an initial analysis of existing stakeholder groups in the study area. This study identified some 290 stakeholder groups and suggested that the most effective way of collecting data on the use of the rivers and associated aquatic resources would be through a series of regional workshops with appropriate stakeholder groups. Before such workshops can be undertaken it is necessary to screen these stakeholder groups to determine whether they still exist, the extent to which they use the aquatic resources of the basin, and the number and location of gropup members. The location and timing of stakeholder workshops will then be based on the results of the screening program.

#### II. REQUIREMENTS

1. The consultant will develop a draft screening questionnaire to be used to determine sufficient information about stakeholder groups to assess whether they ought to be included in subsequent workshops. This questionnaire will be reviewed the leader of the Other Uses Working Group prior to implementation.

- 2. The consultant will review the list of stakeholders and, with the assistance of both the Other Uses and Traditional Knowledge working groups, will identify those groups that are not yet part of any ongoing studies.
- 3. The consultant will contact as many of the stakeholder groups as possible and administer the questionnaire. The results of the questionnaire should be entered in a computer data base for subsequent analysis by the Other Use Working Group.
- 4. The consultant will undertake sufficient analysis of the results to identify which stakeholder groups ought to be included in the subsequent workshops, and recommend locations for six to eight workshops.
- 5. The consultant will provide a brief report which summarizes the results of this project and provides an assessment of the validity of the sample results in terms of response rates and potential errors or omissions.

#### Schedule

This study must be completed by June 30, 1994 and will commence in mid May once the consultant has been selected. It is expected that the inventory of data would require approximately one month while the data review and preparation would require the remaining two months.

There will need to be one meeting in Edmonton in mid May so that the draft questionnaire can be reviewed and the stakeholder list can be screened.

#### III. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

- The Contractor is to provide draft and final reports in the style and format outlined in the NRBS Style Manual. A copy of the Style Manual entitled "A Guide for the Preparation of Reports" will be supplied to the contractor by the NRBS.
- Ten copies of the Draft Report along with an electronic disk copy are to be submitted to the Project Liaison Officer by June 30, 1994. Three weeks after the receipt of review comments on the draft report, the Contractor is to provide the Project Liaison Officer with two unbound, camera ready copies and ten cerlox bound copies of the final report along with an electronic version.

3) The final report is to include the following: an acknowledgement section that indicates any local involvement in the project. Project Summary, Table of Contents, List of Tables, List of Figures and an Appendix with the Terms of Reference for this project.

Text for the report should be set up in the following format:

- a) Times Roman 12 point (Pro) or Times New Roman (WPWIN60) font.
- Margins: are 1" at top and bottom, 7/8" on left and right. Headings: in the report body are labelled with hierarchical b)
- c) decimal Arabic numbers.
- d) Text; is presented with full justification; that is, the text aligns on both left and right margins.
- e) Page numbers; are Arabic numerals for the body of the report. centred at the bottom of each page and bold.
  - If photographs are to be included in the report text they should be high contrast black and white.
    All tables and figures in the report should be clearly
  - reproducible by a black and white photocopier.
- Along with copies of the final report, the Contractor is to supply an electronic version of the report in Word Perfect 5.1
- or Word Perfect for Windows Version 6.0 format. Electronic copies of tables, figures and data appendices in the report are also to be submitted to the Project Liaison Officer along with the final report. These should be submitted in a spreadsheet (Quattro Pro preferred. but also Excel or Lotus) or database (dBase IV) format. Where appropriate data in tables, figures and appendices should be geo-referenced.
- 4) All figures and maps are to be delivered in both hard copy (paper) and digital formats. Acceptable formats include: DXF. uncompressed Eco. VEC/VEH. Atlas and ISIF. All digital maps must be properly georeferenced.
- 5) All sampling locations presented in report and electronic format should be geo-referenced. This is to include decimal latitudes and longitudes (to six decimal places) and UTM coordinates. The first field for decimal latitudes / longitudes should be latitudes (10 spaces wide). The second field should be longitude (11 spaces wide).
